She supports teams through skype /zoom sessions, phones and sometimes field visits after critical incidents. Her last mission took place in 2014 in Jerusalem, for the Swiss Development and Cooperation Department, after the Gaza War.

She has several other permanent mandates, for psychological support after critical incidents for SHA (Swiss Humanitarian Aid), MSF (CH), Max Planck Foundation (D).

She is a trainer for mission preparedness (Stress Management and Personal Safety) for the Swiss government SDC (Swiss Development and Cooperation) and other ngo's.

In Switzerland, she works with police forces, ambulance personnel and firefighters after critical incident. She is the supervisor of street social workers, peer support "blue lights" teams, and care teams, for example, for the University of Lausanne.

Earlier, from 1983 to 1998, she worked abroad as a Field Nurse and Health Delegate for MSF (Médecins Sans Frontières) and the ICRC (International Committee of the Red Cross).
8 years in the field: Afghanistan (Badakhshan), Thai-Kampuchean Border (Aranyaprathet), The Philippines (Mindanao/Zamboanga), Mozambique (Quelimane), Israel /TO (West Bank /Nablus) , Peru (Ayacucho) and 5 years as Health Adviser at the ICRC Headquarters in Geneva.
