#### **Profile**

I am an independent MHPSS specialist with 20 years' experience in the humanitarian field, including in psychosocial programming, capacity building and conducting qualitative and quantitative research. I have gained great satisfaction from being able to contribute to improved policy and practice in the psychosocial field, particularly in conflict and post-conflict settings. I am able to work effectively in difficult circumstances, to overcome challenges and to develop strong working relationships with colleagues in a wide variety of contexts.

### Skills, knowledge and abilities

#### Psychosocial assessment and programming

Experience of developing and implementing new programmes, and of evaluating and strengthening existing programmes. In Kakuma refugee camp, northern Kenya, I was responsible for management of four psychosocial programmes, including a community counselling service and a 'safe house' for women and children at risk of violence or abduction. I have supported organisations to integrate psychosocial approaches into their programming; e.g. LWF's education and child protection programmes in refugee camps in Maban, South Sudan. I have also contributed to psychosocial programming through the development of locally-meaningful psychosocial assessment tools which have demonstrated reliability and validity with the target group (e.g. measures of psychosocial wellbeing and distress for use in Sierra Leone; with women in northern Uganda and DRC; children in South Sudan).

#### Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Capacity strengthening

Developed and taught modules and training packages for various groups; produced training materials and manuals; and supported others to deliver training. Trained and supported local staff to conduct assessments and research in many contexts, and mentored practitioners (both in person and remotely) as they put into practice new skills. Worked with Act Church of Sweden to develop and deliver both remote and in-person capacity-strengthening initiatives designed to strengthen ACT Alliance organisations' community-based psychosocial approaches to programmes in humanitarian and development settings. Teach postgraduate modules in Psychosocial Interventions for Displaced Populations and Community-Based Psychosocial Support.

## Primary research, including assessments and evaluations

More than 25 years' experience of carrying out research in challenging environments. Excellent applied qualitative and quantitative research skills. Have taken full responsibility for many projects, from the development of research questions and research tools, training and management of a research team, data collection and analysis, through to the presentation of the findings to stakeholders and production of a final report.

My qualitative research has made use of in-depth interviews and group discussions, as well as more structured qualitative methods (e.g. participant ranking exercises). Quantitative research has included the pilot testing of new tools to measure psychosocial wellbeing (in Sierra Leone, Uganda, DRC and the UK); and the design and implementation of a complex quantitative evaluation strategy for Mercy Corps Gaza. I am familiar with qualitative and quantitative software packages (SPSS, Nvivo, Dedoose). I have undertaken research on a number of sensitive issues effectively and am able to manage the ethical challenges involved in such projects.

#### **Secondary Research**

Able to identify, review, evaluate and summarise relevant information, including academic literature, organisational reports and grey literature (including unpublished information from those working in relevant fields). Produced high-quality literature reviews and desk reviews, including on faith-sensitive MHPSS for children in humanitarian settings; intimate partner violence in West Africa; and psychosocial support interventions for children and young people in South Sudan. Able to familiarise myself quickly with new issues.

#### Communication

Able to communicate clearly both verbally and in writing with various groups, including practitioners, policy-makers and academics. Presented work verbally in various settings (e.g. 'consensus workshops' to share and discuss initial research findings with stakeholders); produced numerous reports for different audiences; and published over 40 articles in academic and practitioner journals, and as book chapters. Demonstrated ability to produce high-quality written work to tight deadlines.

#### Collaborative approach and good working relationships

I greatly value a collaborative working style, involving stakeholders in all stages of a project. Where possible, I will include all members of a team and relevant stakeholders in planning, implementing and evaluating a project, which has proven to be an effective approach to improving quality and facilitating positive change. Throughout my career, I have been able to develop and maintain excellent working relationships.

## **Personal qualities**

I enjoy a challenge and working under a certain amount of pressure. Very self-motivated, highly organised and able to balance many tasks at the same time; prioritising them and meeting deadlines. I am able to work in complex environments and ensure that challenges are overcome and objectives met. I am flexible, adaptable and able to cope with change. Demonstrated ability to build relationships with people from a wide range of backgrounds, and to adapt to living and working in new environments.
