

Dr CORAL INGLELEY PhD FCG FGNZ

I hold a PhD in Corporate Governance from RMIT University, Melbourne, Australia, with a BA, BCom (1st Class Hons), and Grad Dip Bus in Marketing and International Business from The University of Auckland.

After several years in corporate management, I have had a long career as a university academic and lecturer, most recently in a professorial role at AUT where I taught corporate governance in the MBA programme as well as for the Australian Chartered Professional Accounting qualification, and various management subjects at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. I continue to work on academic research collaborations with international colleagues. My research and published scholarly work focuses on board behaviour, the role of governance in stakeholder engagement, board leadership in sustainability and corporate social responsibility, as well as governance in small firms and urban governance. My most recent work is the *Elgar Encyclopedia of Corporate Governance*, co-edited with Thomas Clarke and Wafa Khlif, forthcoming October 2024. A substantial volume containing 163 rigorous scholarly contributions, the Encyclopedia will be an essential addition to tertiary education libraries globally and a comprehensive reference resource for corporate governance scholars around the world.

I am a Chartered Fellow of The Chartered Governance Institute (CGI) – a global professional organisation based in London – and Chartered Fellow of the Institute's New Zealand Division (CGI NZ). I am a board member of the Institute's global Performance Standards Committee reporting to the CGI Council through the Institute's Director General, overseeing the accreditation and performance of the International Chartered Professional Qualification across all of the Institute's Divisions globally. I held the position of Vice President of Governance New Zealand (GNZ) in 2019 and presently serve as a director on the Board of CGINZ. I am also a member of Division's Education Performance Standards Committee – a position I held as Chair over many years – responsible for the monitoring, moderation and oversight of the International Chartered Professional Qualification in Corporate Governance at the Divisional level. Most recently I have been appointed as an independent director to the board of the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL), whose members comprise the 47 universities across Australia and New Zealand, as well as various government research and scientific agencies and bodies.

My governance experience includes directorships on various not-for-profit boards in New Zealand, including the NZ Contemporary China Research Council comprising senior academic representatives from across NZ universities, government ministries and agencies. Other board roles have included international and regional trade- and economics-related organisations.

My previous corporate executive and general management experience was with the New Zealand divisions of large multinational corporations and with small professional practices. I was also a strategy and business consultant and business mentor in the SME sector for several years.
